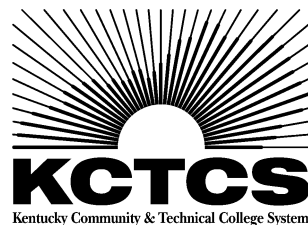

II. Philosophy

Practical nurses are integral members of the health care system, prepared to provide nursing care and health promotion activities to individuals across the life span in various health care settings under the direction of the registered nurse, physician, and /or dentist.

The statement of philosophy and the objectives of the program are consistent with the philosophy and objectives of the governing institution.

The faculty believes:

NURSING is an art and science that assists individuals across the life span with health promotion activities. Inherent to nursing are continued practice, education, and growth.

Practical nursing is administered by **KCTCS** with joint emphasis on didactic and clinical instruction. The practical nurse is prepared to assist with health promotion and to provide nursing care to individuals across the life span utilizing interpersonal communication skills and the nursing process. **Practical Nursing Education** emphasizes the need for ongoing development of nursing knowledge and skills.

LEARNING is a life long process that produces change in behavior. This process enables the individual to become a productive, responsible member of an ever-changing society. We believe that learning proceeds from simple to complex and is enhanced through stimulation of the senses.

The **INDIVIDUAL** is a unique, holistic being worthy of dignity with right to self-determination. The individual has functional health patterns, based on basic human needs across the life span, with rights and responsibilities in relation to self, family, and social groups.

HEALTH is a fundamental right of the individual.

ENVIRONMENT encompasses the interaction of biological, social, and physical components which influence health.

III. Graduate Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the program, the graduate can:

1. Assume the role of a competent, caring practical nurse in a variety of health care settings under the direct supervision of a registered nurse, licensed physician, or dentist.
2. Use the human caring phenomena and the nursing process in providing nursing care.
3. Demonstrate self-direction and responsibility for maintaining nursing competence by pursuing personal and profession development.
4. Communicate effectively with all members of the health care team.
5. Demonstrate accountability of practice with adherence to ethical and legal standards of the profession.

IV. Eligibility

Enrollment in the Practical Nursing Program may be limited because of available laboratory facilities in the community, as well as limited faculty and financial resources at the community college.

A. Technical Standards

Nursing at the technical level involves the provision of direct care for individuals and is characterized by the application of verified knowledge in the skilled performance of nursing functions. All students should possess:

1. Sufficient visual acuity, i.e. to accurately prepare and administer medication and to participate in the observation necessary for client assessment and nursing care.
2. Sufficient auditory perception to receive verbal communication from client and members of the health care team as well as to assess health needs of people through the use of monitoring devices such as cardiac monitors, stethoscopes, IV infusion pumps, dopplers, fire alarms, etc.;
3. Sufficient gross and fine motor coordination to respond promptly and to implement the skills, including the manipulation of equipment, required in meeting health needs;
4. Sufficient communication skills (speech, reading, writing) to interact with individuals and to communicate their needs promptly and effectively, as may be necessary in the individual's interest;
5. Sufficient intellectual and emotional functions to plan and implement care for individuals;
6. The ability to lift and/or move up to 50 pounds and;
7. The ability to be up on feet for 8 – 12 hour clinicals.

V. Commitment

The Practical Nursing Program is a vigorous and intensive program of study. Any student wishing to be successful in the program must be prepared to invest the time needed for adequate study and preparation. Study outside of class is required. Each student needs good support at home. For most students, a major adjustment in their lives is required. Working, time management, childcare, and financial concerns are factors that affect the student's success. The nursing faculty urge students to plan well for this intensive time of study.

VI. Nursing Program Admission Requirements

Acceptance into the Practical Nursing program is based upon a selective admission process. The KCTCS system guidelines and HCC admission guidelines will be followed. In addition, the HCC Nursing Program requirements must be met.

An applicant must submit all application materials by the deadline of **October 30, 2016** for the Spring 2017 admission cycle.

The following must be completed before the nursing application deadline:

- Submit an application to Hopkinsville Community College to the Admissions Office. All college admission requirements must be met.
- Submit high school transcript or GED score sheet to the Admissions Office
- Submit other official college transcripts to the Office of the Registrar for evaluation. The Registrar's office has the final determination in what credits will transfer from other institutions.
- Submit official ACT scores to the Admissions Office. Register at www.actstudent.org.
 - Minimum acceptable score is a composite of 18 or SAT Critical Reading + Math of 860.
 - The writing portion of the ACT is not required for the nursing program.
 - ACT of 18 is a prerequisite. The ACT requirement may be waived in the following situations:
 - Completion of an Associate degree or higher from an accredited University/College
 - Documented military experience as a medic
 - Obtains a composite score of 115 or higher on the NLN Pre-Admission Exam (PAX-RN)
 - **NOTE: If you plan to take or re-take the ACT before the admission cycle deadline, please bring your ACT scores to the Nursing Department to add to your application. You should still have your scores sent to the HCC Admissions office to officially be loaded to the college records system.**
- Attend a Pre-Admission Nursing Conference (PAC) and submit a nursing admission application. The dates and times can be found on the Nursing Website. Please see front cover of this packet for the web address.
- Complete the NAA100 Course with the state testing scheduled or have active status on a state nurse aide registry.
 - The NAA100 Nurse Aide Course can be taken either as a traditional class or as an online class. The traditional class is offered as either an 8-week or 16-week class with classroom lectures, labs, and exams as well as local clinical experience. The online class consists of three (3) modules.
 - Module 1 – Coursework Component: reading text, watching videos, online assignments, 4 exams
 - Module 2 – Proctored Final Exam; Campus lab for skills check off (held at HCC campus)
 - Module 3 – Clinical Experience – 16 hours at long-term care facility (held at facility near HCC)

- ❑ Complete the National League for Nursing's Pre-Admission Exam RN Version (PAX-RN).
 - To be considered eligible, an applicant must score a minimum composite score of 99. We will no longer use the percentile score.
 - A student will be eligible to retake the PAX-RN every six (6) weeks.
 - PAX-RN scores expire after 3 years.
 - A student may register for the PAX-RN exam at Register for exam at <https://ondemand.questionmark.com/400030/ext/nlntesting/>.
- ❑ Must be in good academic standing with the College with at least a 2.0 GPA with a grade of C or higher in all math, science, and pre-requisite courses.

Applicants may be admitted to the program before completing the following pre-requisite classes and having active status on a state nurse aide registry. However, before enrolling in the First Semester PN courses, the following must be successfully achieved:

- ❑ Completion of the following prerequisites or equivalent courses transferred from another college:
 - BIO137 (Anatomy & Physiology I)
 - BIO139 (Anatomy & Physiology II)
 - PSY110 (General Psychology)
 - PSY223 (Developmental Psychology)
 - Student must earn a "C" or higher in all pre-requisites, co-requisites, and nursing courses to progress in the program.
- ❑ Proof of active status on a state Nurse Aide Registry
 - Applicant must be on a state Nurse Aide Registry with active certification by December 31 for the January admission cycle and August 1 for the August admission cycle.
 - Generally, students should allow 30 days from the date they take the state nurse aide exam until their name appears on the state registry.
 - For the January admission cycle, students should allow approximately up to 45 days due to potential slow processing time due to the December institutional closure.
 - Students who need to complete a Nursing Assistant course should do so no later than the first 8 weeks of the spring or fall term prior to the admission cycle they plan to apply for.
- It is the student's responsibility to keep informed of current admission guidelines. The student must be responsible for the status of his/her own nursing file.
- Upon admittance into the PN program, students must have completed or be registered for the first semester co-requisite course AHS120 (AHS115 or CLA131 may be substituted). Due to the nursing course schedule, any co-requisite general education courses should be taken as an evening, Saturday, on-line, or summer class.
- Each NPN course is a pre-requisite for the following semester of NPN courses and must be taken in the sequence listed.
- Co-requisites in Second and Third Semesters must be taken in the indicated semester or before.

- The Kentucky Board of Nursing may deny licensure to a nursing graduate who has been convicted of a misdemeanor or felony that involves acts that bear directly on the qualifications of the graduate to practice. For more information, go to www.kbn.ky.gov.

VII. Selection Process

Admission will be granted to the students who have:

1. **ALL** admission materials submitted by October 30, 2016.
2. All the application and evaluation procedure requirements met.
3. The highest PAX composite percentile score.

*Student must be in good academic standing with the College with at least a 2.0 overall GPA with a grade of C or higher in all math, science, and pre-requisite courses.

VIII. Admission Procedure

Only students with completed files will be considered for admission to the HCC Nursing Program. It is the student's responsibility to ensure the file in the nursing department has all documents necessary for admission.

- A. On the basis of the PAX composite percentile score, the Nursing Admissions Committee recommends to the Academic Dean the names of those who will be admitted to the nursing program.
- B. Applicants will be notified in writing if they have or have not been selected for enrollment in the nursing program. Letters for acceptance, waiting list, or denied admission will be mailed on November 30, 2016. **No selection information will be available by phone.** Please allow up to one week from this date for mail delivery.
- C. A waiting list may also be selected. Applicants on the waiting list may be admitted to fill positions vacated by admitted students. Due to privacy issues, location on waiting list cannot be given to applicants. The waiting list is **only** used for the current admission cycle. The waiting list does not carry to the next admission cycle.
- D. In the event a tie should occur in relation to PAX scores, preference may be given to the student with the highest ACT and GPA generated from the program curriculum pre-requisite courses.

IX. Post-Admittance Requirements Prior To First NPN Course

After acceptance for admission and before beginning NPN courses, students are required to:

- Provide documentation of results of these lab tests:
 - Tuberculosis Skin Test
 - Varicella
 - Rubella titer
 - Rubeola titer
- Provide proof of health insurance.
- Provide proof of immunity to Hepatitis B and tetanus.
- Show proof of completing CPR certification for healthcare professionals through American Heart Association.
- Complete criminal background check – See section XV.
- Complete nine-panel drug screening – See section XV.

YOU WILL NOT BE REQUIRED TO SUBMIT ANY OF THE ABOVE DOCUMENTATION UNTIL YOU ARE ACCEPTED TO THE NURSING PROGRAM.

X. Dress Code Policy for Students Enrolled in the HCC Nursing Program

The Hopkinsville Community College Nursing Programs have set guidelines regarding how students should dress for off-campus clinical days, on-campus simulation labs, and skill check offs.

No specific dress code is in place for on-campus lectures.

CLINICAL ATTIRE MUST BE WORN FOR ALL SIMULATION LABS AND SKILL CHECK OFFS

Uniforms/Scrubs/Lab Coats:

1. Students are to purchase appropriate uniforms/scrubs through the Hopkinsville Community College Bookstore. This includes the uniform top and bottom as well as a lab coat.
 - a. The HCC Bookstore is the required source for purchasing uniforms unless the Bookstore does not have the appropriate size or cannot order a garment, such as a skirt.
 - b. If the Bookstore cannot supply the appropriate size or garment, the student will be responsible for making sure any uniform piece purchased from another source is in a color that is as similar as possible to the color available in the Bookstore. Instructors will advise students if the color is not close enough to the required color. If students disagree with the decision of the instructors, the Program Director will have the final decision.
2. If a student chooses to wear a shirt under the uniform/scrub, it must be white and without markings.
3. For students who choose to wear a uniform skirt instead of uniform pants, white or nude color pantyhose must be worn. Knee socks are not acceptable.
4. Clean, white, solid, closed-toed shoes and white socks are required.
5. A patch with the HCC logo must be worn on the left sleeve of both the uniform and lab coat. The patch should be purchased through the HCC Bookstore.
6. Lab coats and uniforms are to be clean and without wrinkles.
7. A full-length white lab coat is required for covering the uniform.
 - a. A lab coat and name badge is required over street clothes when the student is in the clinical area for the purpose of obtaining assignments.
 - b. No jackets/coats are to be worn over lab coat when in the clinical facility.
 - c. Students are not to wear jeans, shorts, t-shirts, halter/tube tops, sandals/open toe shoes during any on-campus or off-campus clinical, simulation lab, or Layered Learning. No mid-driff showing.

Hair/Personal Hygiene Care:

1. Hair ornaments must not be worn with the uniform, including headbands or ribbons with color. Any accessories used to hold the hair back must be brown, black, or beige to match the student's hair color.
2. For both male and female students, the hair must be worn in a style away from the face and an appropriate style which cannot fall into the field of patient care.
3. Only natural hair colors are acceptable.
4. Hair (including facial hair), body and fingernails must be clean and neat at all times.
5. Fingernails must not be longer than ¼ inch from the tip of the finger and must be without polish. No "fake", acrylic tips or cosmetic fingernails are allowed in any clinical facility (observational activity or a routine clinical day with patient care).
6. Good oral hygiene must be evident.
7. No perfume should be worn in the clinical area.
8. Students exhibiting body odor including the obvious smell of tobacco products will be asked to leave the clinical area and receive an "absence" for the day.
9. No chewing gum is allowed in the clinical area.

Jewelry/Sunglasses:

1. Jewelry is limited to a plain wedding band and one small stud earring on each ear lobe.
2. Jewelry in other visible body piercing must be removed or covered.

- a. Nothing must be in the tongue, lip, nose, or multiple ear piercing. This means that no student may wear more than one pair of earrings.
 - b. The student will be asked to remove the jewelry from any piercing in order to remain in clinical.
 - c. Large piercings must be filled with flesh tone spacers.
3. Sunglasses should not be worn on the top of head or hanging on the outside of the uniform.

Tattoos:

1. All tattoos must be fully covered. This refers to tattoos on any part of the body, including arm, hand, leg, foot, shoulder, neck, and face.
2. For tattoos above the uniform neck opening, a turtleneck or mock turtleneck must be worn.
3. Check with your instructor for suggestions on appropriate ways to cover tattoos.
4. No tattoos must be perceptible by the patient.

Required Accessories for Clinical Attire:

1. A wrist watch with a second hand, a stethoscope, pen light, bandage scissors, and electronic device for clinical resources are required.
2. A pen, pencil, and note paper should be carried in the uniform pockets.
3. Students are required to wear their nursing badges to all clinical labs, including simulation lab and Layered Learning.
4. Goggles are required when performing procedures in which body fluids might contact the student's eyes.

Notice:

1. Any other instructions regarding uniforms will be given prior to clinical in each course.
2. Any alterations to the uniform must be preapproved by Nursing faculty.
3. Infractions of this dress policy may result in the student being sent home from clinical and assigned an absence which must be made up.

IF A STUDENT DOES NOT MEET A PART OF THE CLINICAL ATTIRE POLICY, THE INSTRUCTOR WILL ADDRESS THE ISSUE WITH THE STUDENT ONCE WITH THE OPTION OF GIVING A "U" FOR PROFESSIONAL DRESS ON THE ASSESSMENT TOOL. FOR ANY FUTURE OCCURRENCES, THE STUDENT SHOULD EXPECT TO RECEIVE A "U".

XI. Re-Application Policy

If an applicant is not accepted into the program and wishes to reapply during a different admission cycle, he/she must attend a pre-admission conference and re-submit a nursing application by the desired admission cycle deadline to be considered. All program enrollment requirements must be satisfied for the desired year of application. These materials must be submitted by October 30, 2016.

If you are not accepted into the program after this conference attendance, you must attend a new conference. Attendance to a conference is required each semester you apply for admission into the program.

XII. Re-Admission Policy

In order to be considered for re-admission by the Nursing Admissions Committee, the applicant must:

- 1. Submit a written request to the Nursing Program Director**
- 2. Meet current admission guidelines listed below**
 - ACT minimum composite score of 18 for PN program - Equivalent SAT scores (combined Critical Reading & Math) of 860
 - Good academic standing with the College with at least a 2.0 GPA with a grade of C or higher in all math, science, and pre-requisite courses
- 3. Be recommended by the nursing faculty from the past semester**
- 4. Demonstrate competency by:**
 - a) Passing with a score of 75% or greater, an exam equivalent to the comprehensive final exam for the previously passed nursing courses; and**
 - b) Passing a skills competency review reflective of previously passed nursing courses.**

Note: The exams and skills competency can be taken only once and the student must successfully complete each of the competency exams and the skills demonstration to be considered for readmission.

A student may be considered for re-admission to the Nursing Program one time. The Nursing Admissions Committee may recommend readmission a second time only if a student furnishes sufficient evidence of remedial study, additional preparation or resolution of factors contributing to unsuccessful course completion. Nursing faculty recommendation will be considered.

If more than three years have elapsed since initial enrollment in the first nursing course of the Nursing Program, an applicant must repeat all nursing courses.

Acceptance of any re-admitted student will be dependent upon available space and resources.

XIII. Transfer Policy

Applicants who wish to transfer from one KCTCS Nursing Program or other nursing programs to the Hopkinsville Practical Nursing Program must:

1. Meet all admission requirements of the receiving institution as listed below:
 - Submit an application to Hopkinsville Community College to the Admissions Office. All college admission requirements must be met.
 - Submit other official college transcripts to the Office of the Registrar for evaluation. The Registrar's office has the final determination in what credits will transfer from other institutions.
 - ACT minimum composite score of 18 for PN program - Equivalent SAT scores (combined Critical Reading & Math) of 860 for PN program
 - Attend a Pre-Admission Nursing Conference (PAC) and submit a nursing admission application.
 - For transfers into 1st Semester, you must have an active status on a State Nurse Aide Registry. For transfers into 2nd Semester or later, your status on a State Nurse Aide Registry can be active or lapsed as long as you completed a 1st Semester Fundamentals course with a grade of "C" or higher.
 - Take the National League for Nursing (NLN) Pre-Admission Exam (PAX). See Section VI for information on how to register and minimum score requirements.
 - Good academic standing with the College with at least a 2.0 GPA with a grade of C or higher in all math, science, and pre-requisite courses
2. Notify the Coordinator of the Practical Nursing Program in writing, stating anticipated entry date and reason for transfer;
3. Have a faculty member from the program previously attended submit a letter of recommendation to the receiving institution; and
4. Submit documents to Admissions Committee of previous courses passed as requested (i.e. course syllabi, course content, course skills, etc.).
5. Demonstrate competency by:
 - a) Passing with a score of 75% or greater, an exam equivalent to the comprehensive final exam for the previously passed nursing courses; and
 - b) Passing a skills competency review reflective of previously passed nursing courses.

Note: The exams and skills competency can be taken only once and the student must successfully complete each of the competency exams and the skills demonstration to be accepted. Students who are not successful can elect to enter the applicant pool to the first nursing course.

Mail the transfer documents to the Director of the Nursing Program, P.O. Box 2100, Hopkinsville, KY 42241.

If more than three years have elapsed since initial enrollment in the first nursing course in any registered nursing program, an applicant must repeat all nursing courses.

Acceptance of any transfer student will be dependent upon available space and resources.

XIV. LPN To RN Bridge

Upon completion of the HCC Practical Nursing Program and successfully passing the NCLEX licensure exam, students will be eligible to apply for admittance to HCC's LPN to RN Bridge course. LPNs must be in good standing to apply for this advanced placement into the 2nd Semester of the RN Program Bridge Course.

Licensed Practical Nurses who maintain a nursing license may be admitted into the second semester of the Associate Degree Nursing Program if the criteria for admission is met and the Admissions Committee recommends acceptance. These students may enroll in the NSG 197 Transition to ADN Practice (Bridge Course).

This NSG 197 Bridge Course is 2.5 credit hours (37.5 contact hours) and Lab 0.5 credit hours (22.5 contact hours). Total credit hours is 3.0. The pre-requisites for this course are BIO 137, BIO 139, PSY 110, PSY 223, MAT 150 and CIT 105. Co-requisites are ENG 101, Oral Communications (181 or 252), NSG 215 and NSG 212 with a grade of C or better.

The students in the NSG 197 course are included in the lecture and exam portions of the NSG 210 course with the traditional RN students. The NSG 197 students do not participate in clinical/lab unless this is identified as an area in which they need extra assistance and practice.

Advanced placement students will take a total of 7 credit hours in 2nd Semester Nursing courses 197, 215, and 212 instead of the traditional 10 credit hours.

To be eligible for the bridge course, an applicant must meet the below requirements:

- Submit an application to Hopkinsville Community College to the Admissions Office. All college admission requirements must be met.
- Submit other official college transcripts to the Office of the Registrar for evaluation. The Registrar's office has the final determination in what credits will transfer from other institutions.
- Submit official ACT scores to the Admissions Office. Register at www.actstudent.org.
 - Minimum acceptable score for consideration to the nursing program is a composite of 20 or SAT CR+M combined score of 940.
 - The writing portion of the ACT is not required for the nursing program.
 - ACT of 20 is a prerequisite. The ACT requirement may be waived in the following situations:
 - Completion of a Bachelor's degree or higher from an accredited University/College
 - Holds a current unencumbered license as a Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN)
 - Obtains a composite score of 130 or higher on the NLN Pre-Admission Exam (PAX-RN)
 - **NOTE: If you plan to take or re-take the ACT before the admission cycle deadline, please bring your ACT scores to the Nursing Department to add to your application. You should still have your scores sent to the HCC Admissions office to officially be loaded to the college records system.**
- Attend a Pre-Admission Nursing Conference (PAC) and submit a nursing admission application. The dates and times can be found on the Nursing Website. Please see front cover of this packet for the web address.

- ❑ Complete the National League for Nursing's Pre-Admission Exam RN Version (PAX-RN).
 - To be considered eligible, an applicant must score a minimum composite score of 111. We will no longer use the percentile score.
 - A student will be eligible to retake the PAX-RN every six (6) weeks.
 - PAX-RN scores expire after 3 years.
 - A student may register for the PAX-RN exam at Register for exam at <https://ondemand.questionmark.com/400030/ext/nlntesting/>.
- ❑ Must be in good academic standing with the College with at least a 2.0 GPA with a grade of C or higher in all math, science, and pre-requisite courses.

XV. Math Pre-Requisite Notice

Students interested in beginning in the PN program are encouraged to complete College Algebra (MAT150). The pre-requisite for MAT150 is Intermediate Algebra with Applications (MAT126). Students may be required to take additional pre-requisites depending upon their COMPASS scores.

XVI. Americans with Disabilities Act/Discrimination
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Any physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities is a disability. Any student needing ADA accommodations must contact the Chief Student Affairs Office as well as Peggy Bozarth, Nursing Program Coordinator.

XVII. Expenses & Financial Assistance

Financial assistance is available in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, and work-study. Information on financial assistance can be found on the college website and at www.kbn.ky.gov/education. In addition to tuition costs, nursing students are responsible for supplemental expenses such as: transportation to various clinical facilities, purchase of professional liability insurance, textbooks, blood tests, uniforms, etc.

XVIII. National Council of Licensure Examination

Upon completion of the academic requirements for the Diploma in Practical Nursing, the student is eligible to apply to write the NCLEX-PN providing the terms of eligibility are met for the state in which the student plans to test.

XIX. Program Criminal Background Check and Drug Screen Policies

The Nursing Programs in the Allied Health Division at Hopkinsville Community College require students to obtain criminal background checks through the vendor selected by the Nursing Department. This is to ensure a safe clinical environment for both students and the public and to meet the contractual requirements of area healthcare facilities.

Hopkinsville Community College has established an acceptable screening procedure, which will be provided upon acceptance into the program. Students who fail to submit a background check through the vendor selected by the Program cannot complete or maintain enrollment in any Hopkinsville Community College health program.

If a facility requires additional criminal background checks, it will be the responsibility of the student to obtain the check and have the information sent to the facility.

Because we are a Health Care Industry provider and both the general public and our clinical facilities expect and require drug free students/employees, ALL STUDENTS will be required to submit an annual nine panel drug screening test. Information for completing this procedure will be provided upon acceptance into the program.

The Nursing Coordinator will maintain all records and a confidential database concerning students' criminal histories and drug test results. This information will be filed in a secured area to ensure confidentiality and will not be released to any third party without written consent and knowledge of the student.

XX. Crime Conviction Guidelines

Students that have been convicted of a felony or misdemeanor must submit documentation to the board of nursing in the state of desired application. Contact the board of nursing at least six months prior to graduation. You may want to contact the board of nursing before beginning the program of nursing. The state board of nursing has the final decision to allow students to take the NCLEX. This process should be taken seriously!

Listed below are the actual crime conviction guidelines:

- (1) Pursuant to KRS 314.091(1)(b), a conviction of a felony or misdemeanor shall be considered as bearing directly on the qualifications or ability of an applicant to practice nursing if the conviction involved:
 - (a) Dishonesty;
 - (b) Substance abuse;
 - (c) Sexual offenses;
 - (d) Breach of trust;
 - (e) Danger to the public safety;
 - (f) Physical harm; or
 - (g) Endangerment.
- (2) A felony or misdemeanor conviction shall be reviewed to determine whether:
 - (a) The application shall be processed with no further action;
 - (b) The application shall be processed only after the applicant has entered into an Agreed Order with the Board with terms and conditions as agreed to by the parties; or
 - (c) A Notice to Deny Licensure shall be issued. A Notice to Deny Licensure shall inform the applicant that he may request a hearing. The request shall be in writing.
- (3) A complaint received by the Board alleging a violation of KRS 314.091(1) shall be handled in the same manner as set forth in subsection 2 of this section.
